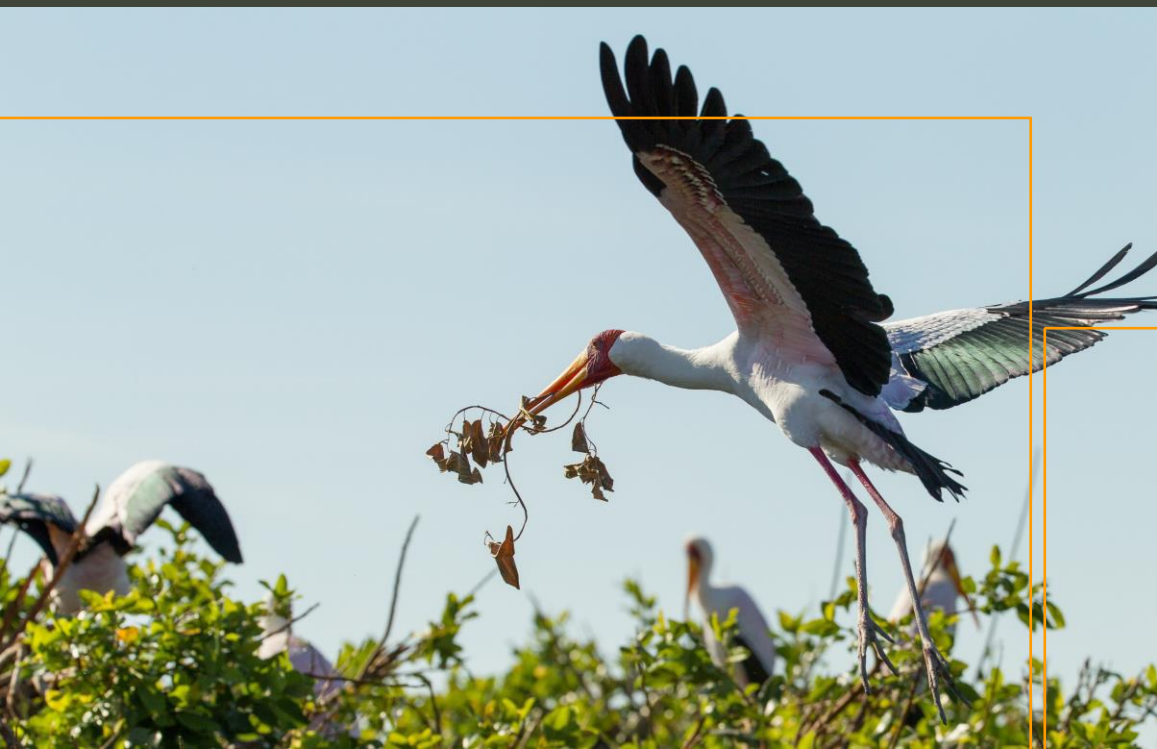

Kanana Heronry

- Located within the Kanana private concession, camp guests are afforded an exclusive experience.
- The largest and most active heronry in Southern Africa.
- Guests may access the area via boat or mokoro all year round. Even in low water level seasons.
- Pel's Fishing Owl have breeding sights on Islands accessible by boat, Mokoro or vehicle.
- The area vegetation consists predominantly of Waterberry trees and Gomoti water fig.





Pink Backed Pelicans

- All the normal Delta bird species are represented, and, from July through October, the heronry plays host to Pink Backed Pelicans, Reed Cormorants, three types of Herons (Grey, Black Crowed Night & Green Backed), Darters, three types of Egrets, Marabou Storks and both Glossy and Sacred Ibis.
- Approximately 100 hectares in extent and the most important Southern African breeding site for Pink Backed Pelicans.
